

MUSICIANS

WILDEN DANNENBERG, FRENCH HORN



Hornist Wilden Dannenberg is a multifaceted performer committed to engaging listeners in a range of musical styles and experiences. With a firm foundation in the repertoire of early to contemporary works, Wilden has been featured as a soloist in such works as Mozart's Third Horn Concerto, Bach's B Minor Mass, and Schumann's Konzertstücke for Four Horns and Orchestra. Wilden enjoys exploring versatile and sometimes adventurous roles of the horn.

He performs with the Deep Roots Ensemble- a group of musicians specializing in the bridging of American Roots and Western Classical traditions, as well as ensembles devoted to improvisation and graphic, animated, and non-traditional notations. He is committed to expanding the solo and chamber repertoire for horn, regularly premiering new works and performing with groups such as International Contemporary Ensemble, Ensemble Echappé and Talea Ensemble.

He is on the faculty of Adelphi University, a member of Bronx Arts Ensemble and wind quintet ConnectFive, and is a recent alumnus of Carnegie Hall's Ensemble Connect. Beyond horn pursuits, Wilden enjoys the fulfilling role of Organist and Choir Director at Christ and San Marcos Episcopal Church in Tarrytown, New York. Originally from Perry, Georgia, he holds degrees from Florida State and Stony Brook Universities. His teachers include David Jolley, Richard Deane, and Michelle Stebleton.

AMIR FARSI, FLUTE



Iranian and Pakistani American flutist Amir Farsi was born and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area. Amir has also made appearances at notable music festivals and halls, including Music@Menlo, Shenandoah Valley Bach Festival, Bang on a Can, Lake George Music Festival, Norfolk Chamber Music Festival, the UN Chamber Society, the St. Lawrence String Quartet Chamber Music Seminar, Marrowstone Music Festival, Banff Centre, Carnegie Hall, and New World Center, as well as at the United Nations

Amir received his bachelor's and master's degrees from The Peabody Institute of The Johns Hopkins University and the Yale School of Music, where he studied with Marina Piccinini and Ransom Wilson. Amir is currently a fellow with Carnegie Hall's Ensemble Connect for their 2020-2023 season.

ELIZABETH FAYETTE, VIOLIN



Violinist Elizabeth Fayette, praised by the New York Times for her "alluring, lustrous sound and seasoned virtuosity", made her Carnegie Hall debut with the Juilliard Orchestra and conductor Alan Gilbert. As a chamber musician she has performed at the Marlboro Music Festival and Ravinia's Steans Music Institute, and collaborated with artists such as Mitsuko Uchida, Jonathan Biss, Samuel Rhodes, Peter Stumpf, Michael Tree, and Peter Wiley.

An in-demand collaborator, Ms. Fayette is a member of several dynamic musical collectives, including the Manhattan Chamber Players, the New York Classical Players, and the Marinus Ensemble. This past season, she served as a guest concertmaster with the Milwaukee Symphony and the Princeton Symphony. From 2016-2020 Ms. Fayette was the first violinist of the Vega String Quartet, Quartet-in-Residence at Emory University. Highlights of her time with the Quartet include performances in Mexico, Alaska and Denmark, as well as their recital debut at Amsterdam's famed Concertgebouw.

Ms. Fayette holds degrees from the Curtis Institute of Music and the Juilliard School, and was a 2014-16 Fellow in Carnegie Hall's Ensemble Connect. Her teachers include Sylvia Rosenberg, Pamela Frank, Shmuel Ashkenasi, and Arnold Steinhardt.

MADELINE FAYETTE, OPERATIONS MANAGER, CELLO



Cellist Madeline Fayette, praised for her "charisma...lovely tone and phrasing", is part of a new generation of artist-teachers creating audiences through inventive community engagement and compelling performances. An in-demand collaborator in both standard and experimental repertoire, she regularly performs with the Fair Trade Chamber Music Society, New York Classical Players, Shattered Glass, and innovative genre-defying organizations Cantata Profana and Heartbeat Opera.

She has also appeared with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, New Jersey Symphony, and Broadway's recent revival of Hello, Dolly with Bette Midler.

Ms. Fayette was a 2017 and 2018 guest artist at the Bravo! Vail Music Festival, where she designed school presentations, interactive performances and engrossing concert programs for audiences of all ages, which culminated in her appointment as Bravo's Teaching-Artist-in-Residence for their 2019 season. Ms. Fayette is also an inaugural member and current Operations Manager of the Annapolis Chamber Music Festival. From 2016-18, Ms. Fayette was a Fellow in Ensemble Connect - a post-graduate program of Carnegie Hall, The Juilliard School, and the Weill Music Institute in partnership with the NYC Department of Education.

Highlights of past seasons include Carnegie Hall performances of Hans Zender's orchestration of Wintereisse with Sir Simon Rattle and Mark Padmore, and Schoenberg's Pierrot Lunaire with legendary soprano Lucy Shelton. She has also appeared with the Joey Alexander Trio at Jazz at Lincoln Center. Ms. Fayette has performed at the Grove, Yellow Barn, Sarasota, and Kneisel Hall music festivals, and collaborated with artists such as Lucy Chapman, Alan Kay, Curtis Macomber, Roger Tapping, and Donald Weilerstein

FITZ GARY. VIOLA



In the summer of 2022, Fitz Gary will join the Garth Newel Piano Quartet as violist and co-artistic director. The Quartet programs and performs over 50 concerts a year and hosts numerous outreach and educational programs at the Garth Newel Music Center in Hot Springs, Virginia.

Fitz, a native of Charlottesville, Virginia, has toured across the United States, Europe, and Asia performing in such venues as

CarnegieHall, the Kennedy Center, London's Royal Albert Hall, and Japan's Suntory Hall. He completed his undergraduate studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Jeffrey Irvine, and graduate studies at The Juilliard School with Heidi Castleman and Hsin-Yun Huang. Selected as a 2013-2014 Fulbright Scholar, he studied with Barbara Westphal at the Musikhochschule in Lübeck, Germany. The school subsequently awarded him the DAAD prize for an outstanding international student, as well as his second master's degree. While in Germany, Fitz also performed with the Grammy-Award-winning NDR Sinfonieorchester (Elbphilharmonie) in Hamburg as a member of their Academy.

Fitz has served as a Clinician Ambassador for the string company D'Addario, as well as the President of the Feldman Chamber Music Society in Norfolk, Virginia. In 2012, Fitz started a project called Music Feeds Us, a chamber music series which ran for seven seasons. The concerts, which have been featured on Performance Today, raised over 175,000 meals for partner food banks in Virginia. As an avid orchestral musician, Fitz has had the opportunity to perform with some of America's most prestigious ensembles, including the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, and the Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center.

ZACHARY HOBIN, CO-FOUNDER, DOUBLE BASS



Zachary Hobin is an exciting young double bassist with wide-ranging musical passions. Currently based out of Raleigh, NC, he is a frequent performer of orchestral, chamber, Baroque and 20th/21st century repertoire, as well as jazz, rock, and other styles. He has recently appeared with the Riverside Symphony and New York Symphonic Ensemble as principal bass and the North Carolina Symphony and Charleston Symphony as section bass. As a chamber

musician, Zachary performs with the Annapolis Chamber Music Festival, a group he founded and runs. Starting this fall, Zachary is taking over a full double bass studio at the Duke University String School.

CHARLES HUANG, OBOE



Dr. Charles Huang has performed throughout North and South America, Brazil, Germany, and Asia. He has concertized with members of the Miami String Quartet, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, and with soloists Humbert Lucarelli, Henrique Pinto, Angel Romero and others. A founding member of Oboe Duo Agosto, he is active in commissioning new works and advancing a wide variety of repertoire for their concerts. A recent project, Daughter of the Sea,

composed by Andrea Clearfield and choreographed by Katie Stevinson-Nollet, features music, movement, and singing and poetry, all performed by the duo. Dr. Huang has been a Fulbright Scholar with studies in Stuttgart, Germany, semi-finalist in the Concert Artists Guild International Competition, scholarship recipient to the Music Academy of the West and the Norfolk Chamber Music Festival, and a winner of the Miami String Quartet Competition. He has recorded music by Phil Salathé, soon to be released by PARMA records, and Keith Kramer, on the Navona Records label, released by the Society of Composer's Inc. He is currently serving on the faculty of the Hartt Community Division for oboe and chamber music, and has given masterclasses at schools and festivals in the U.S., Brazil and Asia, including The University of Michigan, Alabama, SUNY Purchase and Chiayi University in Taiwan. Dr. Huang has also been on the faculty of the Lucarelli Oboe Masterclass presented by Music Mountain, and held the positions of Coordinator for Chamber Music at The Hartt School and Professor of Oboe at the Festival Eleazar de Carvalho in Fortaleza, Brazil. His principal teachers include Dr. Nancy Ambrose King, Humbert Lucarelli, Ray Still and Inao Goritzki.

GRAEME STEELE JOHNSON, CLARINET



Praised for his "elegant and rounded sound" and "gentle lyricism" (Albany Times-Union), Graeme Steele Johnson is an artist of uncommon imagination and versatility. Winner of the Hellam Young Artists' Competition and the Yamaha Young Performing Artists Competition, he has established a multifaceted career as a clarinetist, writer and arranger. His diverse artistic endeavors range from his TEDx talk comparing Mozart and Seinfeld, to his

reconstruction of a forgotten 125-year-old work by Charles Martin Loeffler, to his performances of Mozart's Clarinet Concerto on a rare elongated clarinet that he commissioned. He has appeared in recital at The Kennedy Center and Chicago's Dame Myra Hess series, and as a chamber musician at Carnegie Hall, the Ravinia Festival, Phoenix Chamber Music Festival, Chamber Music Northwest and Yellow Barn. Johnson's concerto appearances include the Vienna International Orchestra, Springfield Symphony Orchestra, Caroga Lake and Vermont Mozart Festival Orchestras and the CME Chamber Orchestra, with an upcoming performance and recording with the Lviv Philharmonic in Ukraine.

Johnson has authored numerous chamber arrangements and performed them around the country with such artists as Valerie Coleman, the Miró Quartet and Hannah Lash. He holds graduate degrees from the Yale School of Music, where he was twice

awarded the school's Alumni Association Prize; other recent accolades include the Saint Botolph Club Foundation's Emerging Artist Award and the inaugural Lee Memorial Scholarship from the Center for Musical Excellence. His major teachers include David Shifrin, Nathan Williams and Ricardo Morales, and he is now a doctoral candidate at The Graduate Center of the City University of New York under the mentorship of Charles Neidich.

MAYA LORENZEN. VIOLIN



A member of the West-Eastern Divan Orchestra (WEDO) since 2016, Israeli/German violinist Maya Lorenzen has performed around the world as a soloist and ensemble player. She is a prizewinner of the 2016 Karl-Adler Competition (Germany) and 2013 Mehta Chamber Music Competition (Israel). Since 2004, she has received annual awards and scholarships from the America-Israel Cultural Foundation.

With WEDO, Maya has performed under the baton of Daniel Barenboim in venues such as the Royal Albert Hall during the BBC Proms, Lucerne Festival, Salzburg Festival, Philharmonie de Paris, Pierre Boulez Hall, Waldbühne Berlin, Carnegie Hall, John F. Kennedy Center, Chicago Symphony Center, and Walt Disney Concert Hall.

Maya has been an invited as asoloist with the Israeli Symphony Orchestra, NK Chamber Orchestra, Jerusalem Symphony, and the Israeli Conservatory Orchestra.

Receiving her undergraduate degree in music performance from Tel Aviv University, Maya continued her master's studies at HfMT Hamburg. She has pursued studies with Haim Taub, Hagai Shaham, Tanja Becker- Bender, Philip Setzer, Jennifer Frautschi and Arnaud Sussmann, and has recently been awarded a Doctorate in Musical Arts from Stony Brook University.

A former teaching assistant at Stony Brook University, Maya performs with various chamber and orchestral groups both in the US and Europe and is dedicated to teaching her growing violin studio. She was a founding member of Ensemble Volans, which commissioned and performed works by various composers from HfMT Hamburg and HM Freiburg.

GEORGE MEYER. VIOLIN



George Meyer writes music and plays the violin. He has performed his own compositions in a variety of settings, including Chamber Music Northwest, Bravo! Vail, the Savannah Music Festival, the Aspen Music Festival, the Telluride and RockyGrass Bluegrass Festivals, and the 92nd Street Y. So far in 2022, he has played an 11-city tour with Sam Bush, Mike Marshall, and his father Edgar Meyer in January and February, and a Michael Hersch premiere in Carnegie

Hall as a guest of Decoda Ensemble in March. In April, his arrangement of a traditional bluegrass gospel song (as performed by Tim O'Brien) for the Aizuri Quartet featured in their opening sets for five Wilco shows at the United Palace in New York City.

His violin teachers have included Naoko Tanaka, Laurie Smukler, Stephen Miahky, Lucy Chapman, Jennifer Frautschi, Carolyn Huebl, and Carol Smith. He holds degrees from Harvard College and the Juilliard School. He is from Nashville, TN.

SPENCER MYER. PIANO



Lauded for "superb playing" and "poised, alert musicianship" by the *Boston Globe*, and labeled "definitely a man to watch" by London's *The Independent* after his 2012 Wigmore Hall recital debut, American pianist Spencer Myer is one of the most respected and sought-after artists on today's concert stage.

He has been soloist with The Cleveland Orchestra, the Cape Town and

Johannesburg Philharmonics, the Indianapolis, New Haven and Phoenix Symphony Orchestras and Beijing's China National Symphony, collaborating with conductors Yannick Nézét-Séguin, Michael Christie, Arthur Fagen Bernhard Gueller, Jahja Ling, Kevin Rhodes, Gerald Steichen, Thomas Wilkins and Victor Yampolsky. His 2005 tour of South Africa included a performance of Beethoven's five piano concerti with the Chamber Orchestra of South Africa, followed by six subsequent return tours. An indemand chamber musician, he has appeared at the Lev Aronson Legacy Festival with cellists Lynn Harrell, Brian Thornton, Ralph Kirshbaum and Amit Peled, and enjoys a recurring partnership

with the Miami String Quartet at the Kent/Blossom Music Festival. Other artistic partners have included clarinetist David Shifrin, soprano Nicole Cabell, and the Jupiter and Pacifica String Quartets.

Spencer Myer's career was launched with three important prizes: First Prize in the 2004 UNISA International Piano Competition in South Africa, the 2006 Christel DeHaan Classical Fellowship from the American Pianists Association and the Gold Medal from the 2008 New Orleans International Piano Competition. He was a member of Astral Artists' performance roster from 2003-2010.

Spencer Myer served on the piano faculty of Boston's Longy School of Music of Bard College from 2016 to 2022, and is currently Associate Professor of Piano at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. He has released four CDs on the Steinway & Sons label — Piano Rags of William Bolcom, and three discs with cellist Brian Thornton encompassing repertoire of Brahms, Debussy and Schumann.

Spencer Myer is a Steinway Artist.

RÉMY TAGHAVI, CO-FOUNDER, BASSOON



Noted for his "bubbling, charming" playing, Rémy Taghavi is a highly sought-after bassoonist and educator based in the Northeast, and has collaborated with numerous groups across North America, South America, and Asia. Rémy has held the position of principal bassoon with the New Haven Symphony Orchestra since 2018 and has performed with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, the Las Vegas Philharmonic, Orchestra New England (ONE), and the Cape

and Princeton Symphonies, among others. His playing can be heard on ONE's upcoming album of the orchestral music of Charles Ives on the NAXOS label. Rémy has performed as a soloist with the Stony Brook Symphony Orchestra and the New York Symphonic Ensemble at Fukuoka Symphony Hall (Japan) and the United Nations (NY).

As a chamber musician, Rémy has given performances at the Banff Centre, Bravo! Vail, the Atlantic Music Festival, FIMAC, Montréal/New Musics Festival, the White Mountains Music Festival, and the Annapolis Chamber Music Festival, of which he is codirector and founder. Mr. Taghavi is the bassoonist in Frisson, the New York-based nonet whose performances have been called "musical perfection" (Royal Gazette, Bermuda). Rémy is an alumnus of Ensemble Connect, a chamber music and career-

development fellowship of Carnegie Hall and the Juilliard School.

Mr. Taghavi is Assistant Professor of Bassoon at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, faculty at the Rocky Ridge Music Center's Young Artist Seminar (Colorado), and taught in the Evening Division at the Juilliard School from 2014-2019. He has presented guest masterclasses and lectures at numerous colleges and universities around the country, most recently at the International Double Reed Society conference in Boulder, CO. Rémy holds degrees from the University of Southern California, The Juilliard School, and Stony Brook University.

MELISSA WIMBISH, SOPRANO



In the world-premiere of Josephine with UrbanArias, "... the afternoon belonged to Melissa Wimbish, who was creating the role of Josephine Baker ... Beautifully prepared, vocally stunning, and theatrically riveting, Wimbish effortlessly held the audience in her hand throughout this one-woman show." (Washington Post) She made her Carnegie Hall solo recital debut after winning the NATS Artist Award Grand Prize.

Melissa's work is relentless in variety, spanning traditional, contemporary, and popular styles. Career highlights include Mysteries of the Macabre and Candide with Baltimore Symphony, Nimue in Shakespeare Theatre Company's Camelot, Carmina Burana and A Midsummer Night's Dream with Washington Ballet at The Kennedy Center, Brahms' Requiem with The 13 Ensemble, Mozart's Requiem with Richmond Symphony, and a self-produced recital film for the INVISION recital series which the Baltimore Sun called "sensational and groundbreaking."

In the 2021-22 season, Melissa made her soloist debut with the Vermont Symphony, premiered 20 Minutes of Action by Jessica Meyer with Sandbox Percussion Ensemble at Yellow Barn's Chamber Music Residency, performed the role of Stella-Rondo in the world-premiere of Why I Live at the P.O. at the Keegan Theatre, produced and performed Release the Gowns: An album release event by Outcalls at The Voxel Theater, and made her National Sawdust debut in Britten's Les Illuminations at ChamberQUEER Festival.

Melissa lives in Baltimore and co-leads the pop duo, Outcalls who have been dubbed the "reigning queens of Baltimore's music scene" by Baltimore Magazine. They released their third studio album, Greatest Hits, Vol. 1 in spring 2022. Learn more at melissawimbish.com.
